

## La BELLE COEUR D'ALENE

As only the French can—so the very first buckskin-clad, barrel-chested trapper voyageurs must have rolled their eyes and clucked tongues in pure French appreciation of this beautiful valley and lake, later to be known as the Coeur d'Alene.

A long time ago, Father DeSmet, the famous Jesuit, talked with the Indians at Camp Nchim Kilgos, about where North Idaho Junior College now stands. General Isaac Stevens, later governor of Washington, explored here. Captain John Mullan came with his survey crew. General William T. Sherman, of Civil War fame, brought the Army in 1879.

Less illustrious but more colorful characters all took from the Coeur d'Alene but left something, too. Men like Ewing Young, Broken Hand Fitzpatrick, Jim Bridger and John Falcon.

These men were all traders and trappers of the first class but, as the French voyageurs before them, they met their match in the sharp-bargaining acumen of the Indians in this area.

It is said that long faces on the part of the French traders for being unable to exploit local natives in fur bargaining prompted the Indians to call the traders broken or pointed hearts. In desperate derision the traders laughed and attempted to save face by calling the Indians "pointed or sharp hearts", which translated into the French language, means Coeur d'Alene. Because of the pleasant and musical intonation of the words the name stayed.

The history of Coeur d'Alene really began with the establishment of Fort Sherman in 1879. The Army Post gave the essential boost in brisking up the economy of the area. An extremely important phase of Coeur d'Alene history was the stern-wheeler steam boat era. This region started to move and vibrate during the 1880's. The need for a more extensive transportation complex was recognized and so the stern-wheelers came into their own on the lake.

The day of the paddle-boat was initiated by the Amelia Wheaton, named after the daughter of General Frank Wheaton, the top brass of Fort Sherman at that time. These stren-wheelers were big, well-built craft that could do a real "Mississippi" job. Captains who commanded these boats and the crews who manned them were classic representatives of the strong individualists and independent personalities who contributed in large measure to the total picture of today. With the building of highways the big "lake belchers" were doomed and about 1930 the last of a proud line of stern-wheel steam boats were burned to provide entertainment for an obscure crowd of gawkers at a more obscure 4th of July Celebration.
