



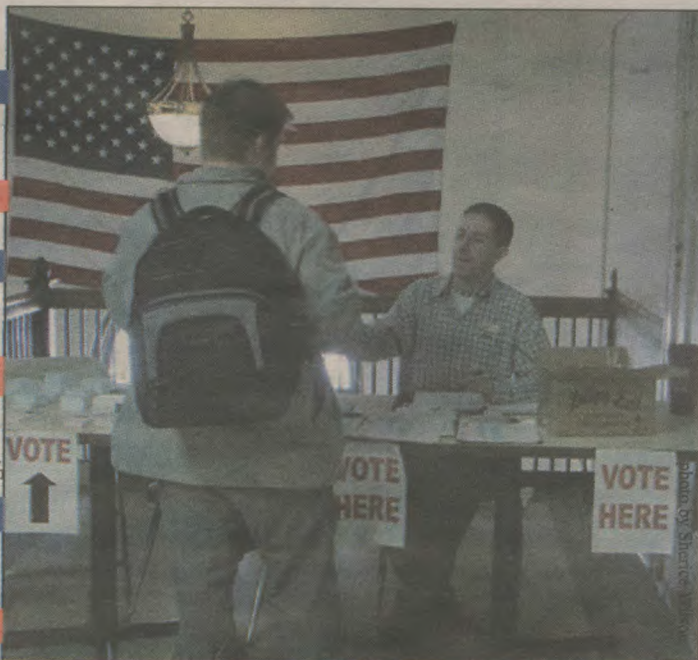

Elections for next year's Student Government Association were held last Tuesday on both the Harborside and Downtown Campuses.

The results were tabulated within two hours of the conclusion of the election and announced at the Elections Reception in the Citizens Bank Center for Student Involvement by the current

Executive Vice President, Crystal Lee Chapman.

The position of Student Body President was the only contested race. Albert Hilliard, the current Student Body President was re-elected, defeating opponent Beau Czerwinski with 62 percent of the vote. Maryland native Hilliard, a Computer Science major, has served on the Student Government

Association since the start of his Johnson & Wales career as Clubs & Organizations Committee Vice President and Clubs & Organizations Senator. He will serve his fourth and final year as Student Body President.

"Serving two terms can sometimes be very beneficial. It allows for a President to

## The Chair of Jack Morton Worldwide Gives Vision to Graduate Students

The University was recently visited by the chairman of Jack Morton Worldwide, Bill Morton, the company that will produce the Opening and Closing Ceremonies of the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens.

On April 2nd, Morton spoke on his visions with students in the Alan Shawn Feinstein Graduate School to empower those who have dreams.

"Having vision and dreams are very important in your life," says Morton. "If I had not had a dream or a passion,

I couldn't have pursued the things I did."

During his speech, Morton explained how in 1984 he was invited to attend the Olympic Opening Ceremonies in Los Angeles, California. He watched the ceremony, and wondered if he would ever be able to produce an event of that enormity. Nearly 20 years later, Morton found out when the Olympic Committee announced its choice.

After declining the University's original bid, Sean Paul agreed to perform at the Wahoo. Unfortunately, soon after the term agreement, a ClearChannel College representative called with bad news. Sean Paul is reportedly hospitalized due to said throat problems and needs to rest up the next ten to fourteen days.

"You can't control sickness," says Assistant Director of Student Activities, Tim Lorenz. "It's something you can't avoid and happens everyday in the entertainment industry."

After compiling a list of potential artists, board members of the University Involvement Board brought the list to the attention of ClearChannel College Entertainment. The Agency then checked the artist availability. Available artists had the opportunity to decline or accept a bid put in by the University. Many of these artists who either weren't available or declined the bid include Amerie, Wayne Wonder, Talib Kweli, Fabolous, and Beenie Man, Dave Matthews, Fat Joe, and now Sean Paul.

Fortunately, this mishap occurs a week before the Wahoo which gives the University just enough time to replace Sean Paul with two or three national acts. Even with the change of plans for the main event, the daytime events will still continue as planned.

The day will consist of free food, carnival rides, and many novelties.

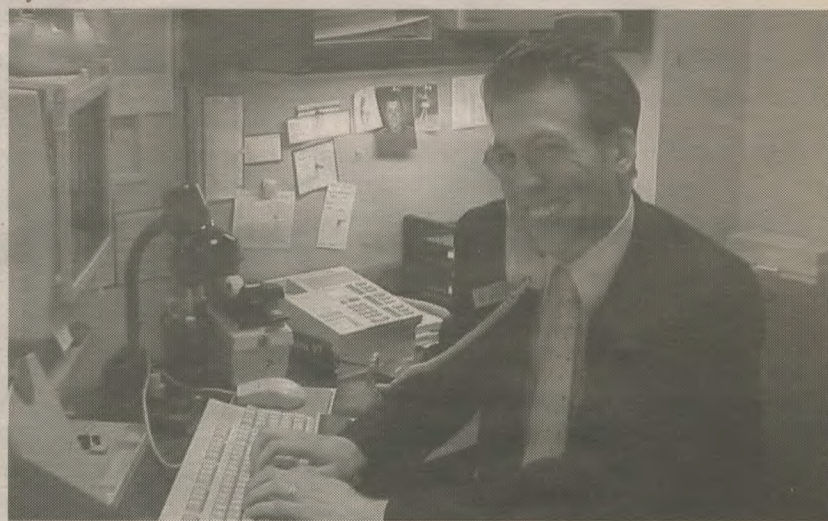

J&W's Entrepreneur Program Named to Top 100 List

The Larry Friedman International Center for Entrepreneurship at Johnson & Wales University has been named one of the Top 100 U.S. Colleges and Universities for Entrepreneurs in the April 2003 issue of Entrepreneur magazine. Over 700 entrepreneurship programs were researched for the study. Johnson & Wales also appears in the list of the top 50 regionally recognized academic programs in the country.

"We're thrilled with this recognition," said Ken Proudfoot, director of the center based at the Providence Campus of the multi-campus University. "It validates the quality of our faculty and reflects the dedication of a top-quality program."

The program was established in 1988 and currently offers eight courses to students at the University.

Entrepreneur's first annual evaluation of the best entrepreneurship programs at U.S. colleges and universities was conducted from September to December 2002 by TechKnowledge Point Corp., the first entrepreneurship/business develop-

ment research and referral exchange.

In 1970, a national survey of business schools found only 16 courses offered in entrepreneurship. Over the last 30 years the idea of entrepreneurial education has exploded. Currently, TechKnowledge Point has data on over 875 entrepreneurship programs at colleges and universities in the U.S. Entrepreneur magazine breaks down the various types of entrepreneurship programs and advises students how to choose one that meets their needs.

More than 30 criteria were used in the study, including course offerings, teaching and research faculty, business-community outreaches, research centers and institutes, degrees and certificates offered, and faculty and alumni evaluations. In addition, almost 300 colleges and universities responded to surveys designed to allow program directors, faculty and alumni to rank their own entrepreneurship programs against the competition. These results appear along with the top 100 list in Entrepreneur's April issue.

eRecruiting is a database that is populated with employment opportunities; employers, from every business facet, contact J&W directly and solicit jobs in our database. These employers may advertise their employment opportunities elsewhere, but imagine actual job opportunities for J&W eyes only in one concise, easy to access location. That's right...you guessed it, it's called eRecruiting!

Career Development & Alumni Relations took a minute to ask our resident expert a few questions about the eRecruiting process, finding out answers to some of your burning questions.

Q: How do you register for an account?

Tim: "Almost everyone is automatically registered once enrolled in the University. Accounts are created in large batches two times per year. I say, "almost" because some students' accounts are not created due to late registration, transferring, etc."

Q: What happens when your username and password doesn't work?

Tim: "Many students confuse their

eRecruiting login with their email login. This is a big issue. Unfortunately, email and eRecruiting are hosted on different servers and they require different login information.

By default, usernames are the student's social security number (with dashes) and passwords are the student's first initial and last name (all lowercase.)"

Q: Whom should you contact if you run into technical difficulties?

Tim: "If you have a question, email: [experiencequestions@jwu.edu](mailto:experiencequestions@jwu.edu) or call me directly, 401-598-2457."

Q: If an issue should arise, what is the response time?

Tim: "Response time is purely based upon the volume of emails/voice-mails."

Q: What is the most valuable piece of information you can give regarding eRecruiting?

Tim: "Be sure to update your profile. When we receive a great job opportunity, we send an email to students who might be interested. Students are emailed based upon their profile and contact info on eRecruiting. If a student's profile information on eRecruiting is incomplete or inaccurate, he or she misses the notification." Take a minute to check out eRecruiting.com, <http://jwu.erecruiting.com>, it's quick, it's relatively easy, and it will help you bypass a few steps in the career search circus.

# J&W Student Receives National Scholarship Award

The tuition cost of a J&W undergraduate business student for the 2002-03 school year is approximately \$14,562. Once acclimated into the college atmosphere, students quickly learn the importance of grants and loans. One of these students, who has quickly learned happens to be the current president of the J&W chapter

of the NAACP, Akosua Tyus.

On Wednesday, April 9, Tyus was awarded a \$500 scholarship by the John D. O'Bryant Think Tank for Black Professors in Higher Education on Predominately White Campuses as the North Regional winner in the National Merit Scholarship contest. Out of 31 applicants, Tyus rose to be one of six national winners with potential to be awarded an additional \$500 as the national winner.

This non-profit corporation based out of the University of Cincinnati, consists of individuals whose primary purpose is the reclamation, critique and perpetuation of the culture of people of African descent who

study on predominately white colleges and universities.

"There are so many issues blacks face on a predominately white campuses whether it is retention, recruitment, or employment," says JDOTT National President, Eric Abercrombie. "JDOTT's focus is to create an environment to have people who know much about the issues and strive to change them." Abercrombie continued by speaking on Tyus' qualifications.

"She is an outstanding young lady and it is a credit to Johnson & Wales University to have such a person on your campus," says Abercrombie.

# TV Food Network: A Look Behind the Scenes

*A Campus Herald Staff writer goes behind the scenes in New York to give an in depth look of the Real TV Food Network.*

The TV Food Network building, an unassuming warehouse in midtown Manhattan, hides a labyrinth of studios, offices, control rooms and prop rooms. Only one well-equipped kitchen puts out all of the food for the shows taped in New York City, Emeril being perhaps the most famous chef on television these days. To minimize time spent away from

their usual routines, the celebrity chefs (known internally as "the talent") come to the studios for at least a week at a time to allow for the greatest possible number of tapings - up to 4 shows a day. The TVFN kitchen staff, culinary school interns, and outside freelance workers (mostly culinary school graduates) begin the prep for a show by "shopping." The show script lists every ingredient needed. Interns fill rolling utility carts for the daily produce and meat deliveries as well as from the well stocked pantry (which also serves as the holding pen for the Emeril Live guests!). Then, we take a moment to thoroughly read the script.

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

### U.S. Under Political Suicide

For the last few weeks the world's newspaper and TV headlines are all about the war on Iraq. When I get home the TV is already set in one of the news channels, the war is happening right in front of me, in my bedroom.

Although I might want to talk about the validity of this war, I'll spare you from that, I'll leave it to your own conscience and good judgment. My question today is: what President Bush, and his team, think they are doing in terms of world politics? To me it seems very strange that the US has embarked in such a wild crusade by itself (ok, it has the support of the UK, tell me when it didn't!), without a massive support from the international community, and even ignoring the United Nations.

You are not trustworthy anymore.

If you are reading the international newspapers you can already see that the USA has lost the respect of many countries. The last thing I read in a Brazilian newspaper was the following joke: "what is the difference between the Roman Empire and the current US government?", answer, "the highest position that a horse reached in the Roman Empire was that of a senator" (look for Caligula and Incitatus). Not that I agree with the remark, but that is the kind of talk that is currently available in the international media. German, French and Italian newspapers are giving wide coverage of US's problems in Iraq, and also to all the anti-war protests. Two weeks ago the 1998 literature Nobel prize winner, Gunter Grass, said that for the first time he was proud to be German, referring to the country's strong anti-war position.

I repeat, one more time, that I am not saying that Iraq does not have weapons of mass destruction and so on, but, if the war objective is global safety, the course of action should be global as well. My fear is that the outcome of a victory by the US in this war won't necessarily be peace.

And Finally, I am not so naïve to expect that the US will give up on its crusade against Saddam, nor change its current foreign policy. All I am trying to do is to question how things are being done, how history is being made. We will see the outcome of all this sooner then we expect. Now, all we can do is hope that all our beloved compatriots, now overseas, return home safely.

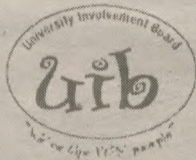

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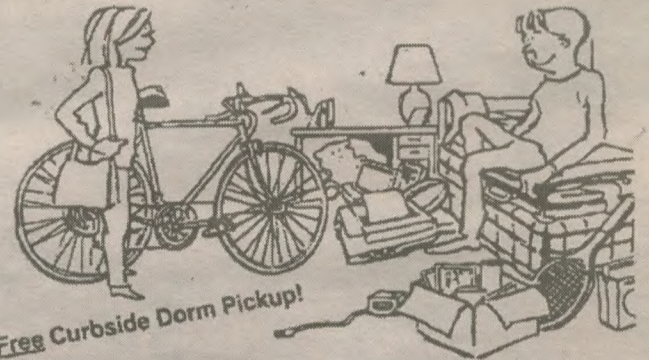
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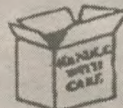

Interns must understand how many times each dish is to be made (called "swaps") and up to what point (usually we make a complete dish and mis en place another for the talent to prepare on air). Then the fun begins. We gather an assortment of clear bowls in all sizes, measuring cups and spoons, plastic wrap and half sheet trays and the rest of the day is a mis en place festival. Often, we watch the taping on a monitor in the kitchen. Seeing one's food on TV is a very exciting experience and one begins to watch cooking shows in an entirely new manner. It also highlights the importance of perfection in the presentation. We are encouraged to take our time and get it right rather than risk mistakes by speedy yet sloppy knife work. At the end of the day there could be 8-16 utility carts (each of the 4 acts gets their own cart) piled with many variations of each recipe. Organization is key, as these carts get rolled into the studio to await propping and arranging by a different set of kitchen staff.

Now, for many of us culinarians, big kitchens with multiple mixers or #10 cans of mustard are no big deal. Most kitchens, however, are not located adjacent to a television studio. The room is huge, with cameras and lighting equipment and wires running every which way. One can not help

but gaze in awe. The small kitchen area that services the show contains an electric stovetop, a microwave, a flash bake oven, minimal counter space, 2 refrigerators, plenty of utensils, but no running water. Large folding tables around us hold countless piles of props: plates, bowls, glassware, Emerilware in every color and shape just waiting to complement a food item on screen. Before taping begins, the kitchen staff instructs the talent on the organization and flow of the recipe. The camera crew then reviews the angles and other technical areas of production. Once the theme music starts, all on the set must be very quiet. If no mistakes occur and the taping goes smoothly, a completed half hour show takes about an hour and a half to make.

The rush of moving fast in between acts, and setting up the next act, is akin to restaurant work, but in general the work at the TVFN is quite different. For one, the culinary producer has already done the creative work; our job is to execute the recipes and scripts as they are written. The discipline needed to perform these tasks hones reading, comprehension, knife, and product identification skills. And when Emeril walks into the kitchen to thank everyone for a great show, it makes one want to do just as well the next day. Nothing is better than a pat on the back from the talent.

## Food Science Club Visits Military's Food Research Laboratory

MRE, or Meals Ready-to-Eat, are provided to soldiers for a portable means of food supply. The soldiers hydrate (in some cases), heat and serve their three meals of the day. On Friday, April 11th, culinary students drove to Massachusetts to spend the day at the United States Army Natick Soldier Center. Professor Tripp and Professor Eaton accompanied students on the trip. Students were exposed to various sections of the product research and development facilities, including a history of MRE foods.

The tour surprisingly began with a lecture on sports nutrition by Johnson & Wales University's Chef Sacks. Sacks informed the military's nutrition and food research staff as well as students on the different menu needs of highly physically active individuals. From protein needs to carbohydrate metabolism, Sacks educated attendees on different methods of increasing the performance of an active individual through proper nutrition. The benefits of incorporating soy into the diet, which include its high bioavailability and its amino acid profile, were also stated. Chef Sacks is one of the few chefs in not only in the university, but the industry who is a Registered Dietician as well.

The next stop was a visit to the different equipment used by soldiers. For example, an electronic grill, which could be cleaned in 15 minutes, is used in submarines. Commercial electronic grills differ because they take around two hours to clean, and also have longer heating times and temperatures. The research lab also develops and investigates different packaging for their food products.

Students then proceeded to the MRE museum located on the grounds. MRE foods began by can packaging and even contained a mini packet of cigarettes along with each meal. Durable plastic is now used for packaging, and cigarettes are no

longer given to soldiers. Then again soldiers do create smoke, but only with their single serving Tabasco hot sauce. A new method of heating foods has come forth during research that minimizes shrinkage and saves texture. This heating method is incorporated through pressure and was developed by the biochemist of the laboratory. The United States Military surprisingly developed nutrition research, The RDA's that set the diet guidelines today were originally developed through government nutrition research.

Lunch was provided by the facilities and provided a tasting menu of MRE foods. A variety of foods were offered. Students were overall pleased with the meal and even developed favorites, such as the brownie and the cheesy bacon potatoes. The students were even given samples of the army's very own sport's bar, the HOOHA! Bar, and sport's drink. The HOOHA! Bar and sport's drink contained many of the same ingredients found in other sport's bars available today.

A sensory science lab is also part of the facilities. Random volunteers are seated with individual computers and evaluated the sample foods though degree of liking, flavor, texture, aroma, and appearance (just like in food science class). The lab is part of POET, Product Optimization and Evaluation Team, under the Technology Directorate and Supporting Science, which serves the military.

Students and faculty were especially excited about the trip and some are even looking forward to applying for an internship in the facilities.

MRE must meet certain nutrition requirements set by the army's dieticians. The direct connection between food and nutrition creates a perfect environment for J&W Culinary Nutrition Students to display their skills.

## Kosher Law Should Be a Part of Culinarian's & Nutritionist's Vocabulary

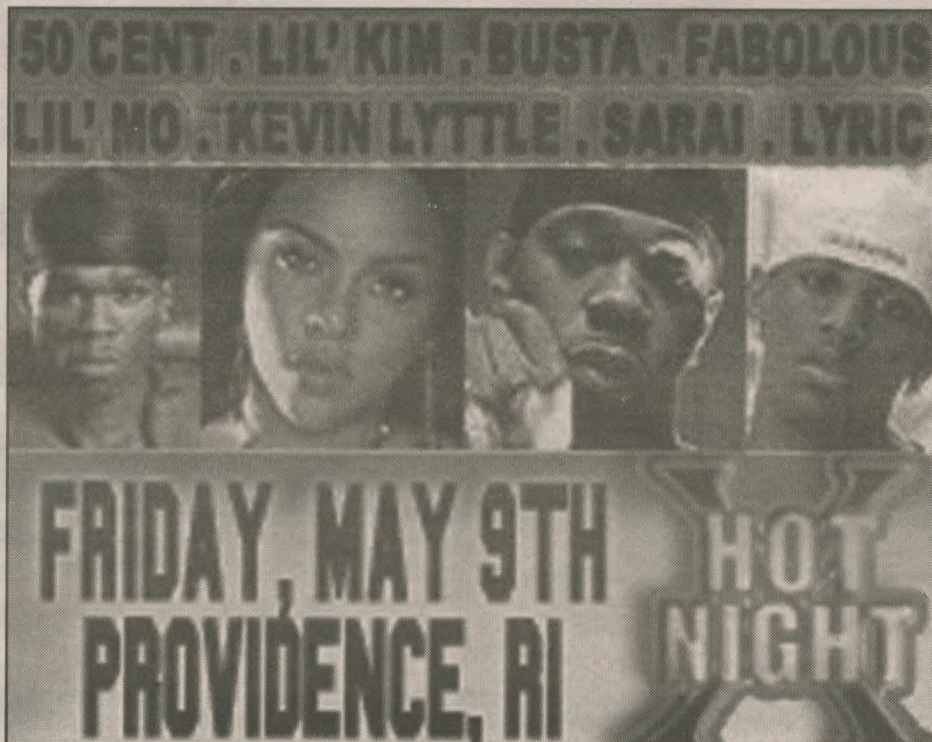

Kosher law is an important sector of not only the food business, but in dietetics as well. The Nutrition Society realized its importance and organized a mock Symbolic Seder at Hospitality on April 8th. The Johnson & Wales University's Rabbi was the speaker of the event and informed students not only on kosher laws, but also the Seder as well. Jennifer Kane and Kim Burns prepared the food, which constituted of a variety of desserts for Passover.

The Rabbi began by defining the term Kosher, which means fit and proper, cleanliness, and also to keep oneself in a relationship with God. He proceeded to explain that kosher law separates meat from dairy. The philosophy behind this is from a religious scripture stating that one should not cook a baby with its mother's milk. Orthodox Jews go as far as separating meat kitchenware from dairy

kitchenware. Vegetables and fruits are neutral and can be paired with either meat or dairy. Butter and margarine is considered dairy, therefore, cannot be paired with meat. Waiting to eat dairy after meat can be anywhere from one to six hours, depending on the family's/individual's beliefs. Consuming dairy before meat is kosher.

Non-kosher foods include: all shellfish, pork, hoofs, cloves, wild animals, must be a Kosher feed, must be killed through a kosher ritual where the animal dies instantly, no animal who has a tumor, no meat from the hip down, and no blood (which includes bloodspots on eggs). Fish must have fins and scales and they cannot be bottom feeders. Fish can only be consumed with dairy, and not meat. Some take kosher law as far as only eating organic foods, which further the beliefs of being kosher.





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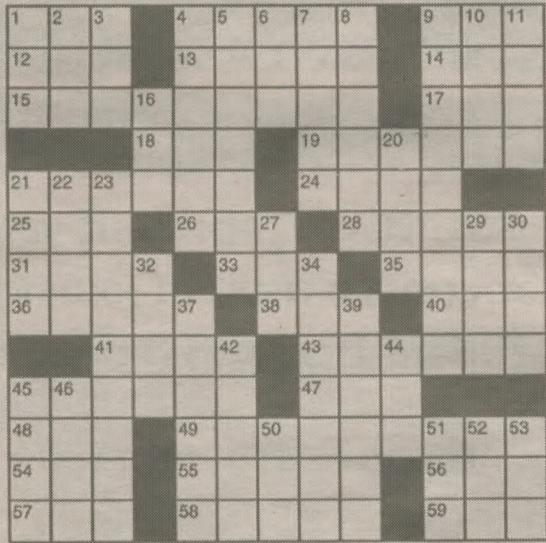

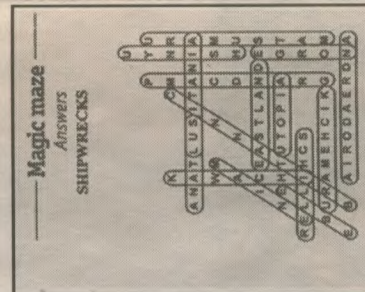
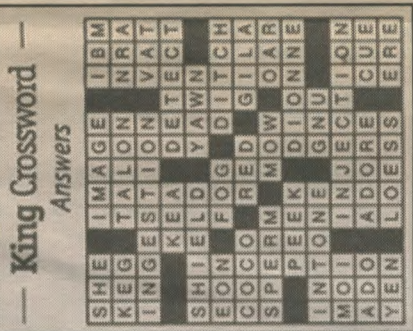
