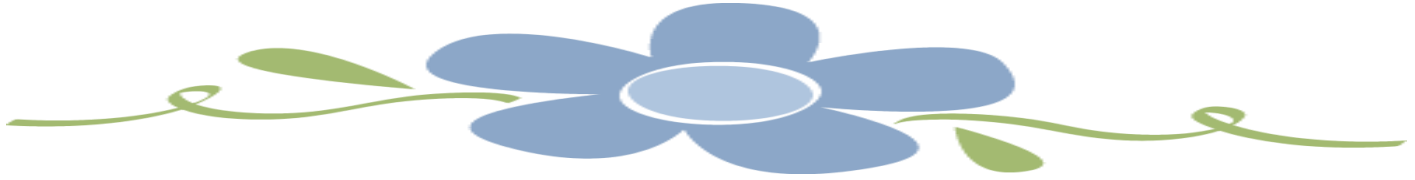
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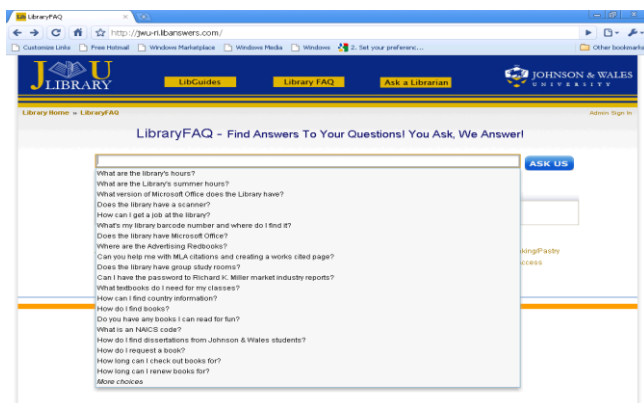


Have You Tried **Library FAQ?**

It's clear that students love getting help from the library using IM and texting. Since launching these services JWU librarians have noted the numbers of IM and texting transactions increasing monthly. But how can a student get help when the library is closed? One way is by using **Library FAQ**, a JWU Library web-based Q&A service that can store hundreds of commonly asked questions and answers. So far there are **106**, including:

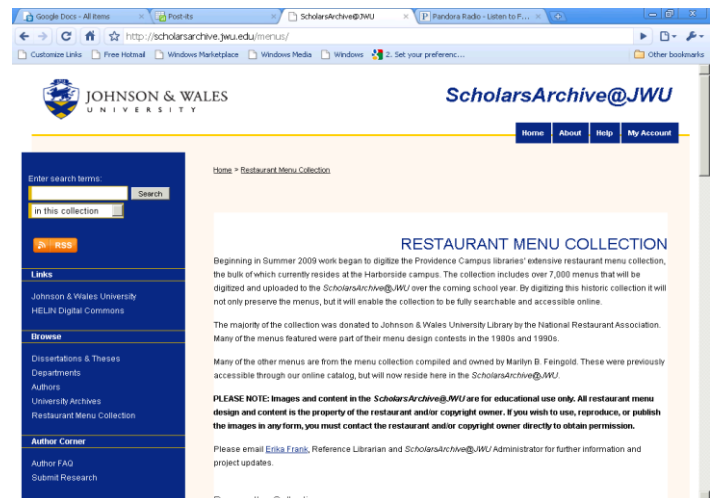
- Does the library have Microsoft Office?
- Where are the Advertising Redbooks?
- How do I find dissertations by JWU students?
- Can you help me with MLA citations?
- What is an NAICS code?
- What textbooks do I need for my classes?

And many more! Anyone can start typing a question in the site's search box. If any of the keywords match keywords in previously asked questions, those questions and answers will be displayed. If none of the Q&As meet the asker's needs, they will then see the option to enter their own question and get an e-mail response within 24 hours. Try it at <http://jwu-ri.libanswers.com/>



Restaurant Menus Online

The **Scholar's Archive @ JWU** is gaining national recognition as a source of important research information for anyone interested in what restaurant menus can tell us about culture, society and food. Through the ongoing efforts of reference librarian **Erika Frank**, more than 600 menus from around the world and representing a range of different decades of the 20th century, are now digitized and available for viewing by anyone with access to an Internet connection.



Since summer 2009, Frank has been working on a project to digitize the entire JWU collection of 7,000+ menus, many donated by the **National Restaurant Association**. For easy browsing, the menus in the Scholar's Archive are organized by some 53 separate categories, including various ethnic cuisines as well as such specialties as: Catering, Banquet & Events; Diners & Roadside; Hospitals & Healthcare; Prix Fixe; Tapas; Transportation, and more. Meet Mr. Brown, '97, B.A. '00, M.A.T. '02

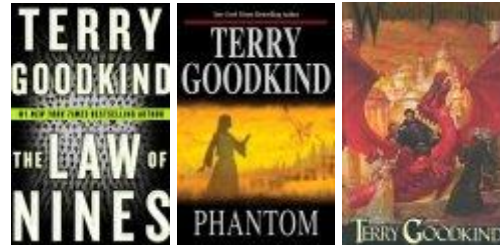
Fred Brown, Reference Management Librarian, has been a fixture at the Harborside Campus Library since July 2000. As a student at JWU, Fred earned a degree in Culinary Arts in 1997, a Food Service Management B.A. in 2000, and a Master's of Teaching in 2002. While employed as a student assistant at the library, he discovered his true calling and went on to obtain an M.L.I.S. (Master of Library and Information Studies) from the University of Rhode Island in 2006.

Brown was born on Conanicut Island in Jamestown, Rhode Island. A "foodie" in every sense of the word, Brown loves to cook, talk about cooking, and listen to students as they enthusiastically describe their latest culinary creations. On display in his office at the Harborside Library are posters of the Rhode Island seashore, in addition to his collection of figurines of famous sci-fi characters. A multifaceted, enthusiastic dynamo, Brown is most often found on the computer network, surrounded by students clamoring for his attention. Brown has published several **LibGuides** on Culinary Arts and Nutrition.
