The Johnson & Wales University Library has extended its web presence by rolling out virtual reference via Instant Message. During the day & evening, 7 days a week, you can get help on any topic by just sending an Instant Message via the library's website at library.jwu.edu/prov without ever having to leave your home!

The library rolled out this pilot program in October and has already received over 175 requests for assistance via IM.

learning program, an initiative that began this Winter Trimester, the library felt that virtual help via instant message would help to fulfill the needs of distance learners."

Prof. Brian Alves. School of Technology, wanted to inspire students in his Desktop Publishing class to take part in the then upcoming Presidential elections.


Students had to create an motivational poster with a simple message, GET OUT AND VOTE!
