

Second year students are involved in advanced cooking techniques, classical & international cusines, cost control, menu and facilities planning and communications.


For one trimester of the sophomore year, students are required to participate in practicum training. Practicum is held in Providence in our main campus facilities. Students also are given the chance to



The Food & Beverage Committee of the American Hotel & Motel Association joined with Johnson & Wales to design the University's Food & Beverage Management program. The program trains students to be "room managers" — men and women responsible for the efficient operation of hotel dining room, banquet facilities, lounges and related hotel food and beverage services.

When students complete the program they may continue in the Bachelor of Science Degree program in Hotel-Restaurant/Institutional Management.



home or industrial cafeteria.


The associate degree program introduces students to basic food preparation techniques while emphasizing administrative practices and procedures.

In Future Years

Hospitality Management includes such courses as Economic Geography, Hotel Engineering, Hospitality Marketing and Dynamics of Tourism.

Hotel-Restaurant Institutional Management includes such courses as Labor Economics, Hotel Information Systems, Convention & Group Planning and Front Desk Operations.










Making A Splash



Continuing Education At Johnson & Wales Gives The Chance To Have A Career Change.


BALANCING ACT
